2002 Guild Project - Spot Sampler

We have a very full agenda for January's general meeting! First, there will be a book review and sale Bring your favorite needlework books to review for the group during our "Show and Tell" time. Do you have any needlework books that you would like to sell? Perhaps you bought an extra copy of a book you already owned. Here's you chance to make room on your bookshelf and sell the extras to other guild members. Just books and magazines, please, no charts or kits.



We will start the 2002 guild project, a 17th century spot motif sampler from the Essamplaire. Kits will be distributed to those who preordered them. A stitching schedule for the year will also be provided and reviewed. If you haven't ordered a kit yet and you would like to participate in the project, it's not too late! You can still get the kit directly from the Essamplaire.

Elaine Hoagland will present the program: "Abigail Chase" by Joanne Harvey.

Abigail was born in 1771 in Haverhill, Massachusetts. She married Oliver Morse in 1796 and raised nine children. This sampler may have been her first stitching endeavor as a very young child. At the top is one alphabet and some dividing bands, and on the bottom is a pastoral scene with mounds, flowers, strawberries and an unusual fruit tree. This tree is similar in style to other embroideries from the Haverhill area. There are two simple borders, one unfinished. Colors are reds, brown, greens, golds, and blues. The kit cost is \$14.50. You must have registered by the December meeting in order to receive the kit.

Highlights

We had a great start to 2002: good weather and high attendance at our first meeting of the new year. We set up our books to sell on a table at the side of the room. We decided that this was such a great way to find new homes for used books that we would do it again at the next meeting. First on the agenda was reports from the new board officers. Next was "Show and Tell".

Sue Hamer finished the Rachael Hyde sampler and brought it for "Show and Tell". The text in the lower right reads: "Rachael Hyde of norwich her sampler made in the

14 year of her age". The sampler was the first Lake Michigan Sampler Guild project in 1999 and is available from Threads Through Time. Susan Schar shared a project in progress that will be a model for a future kit available

from Margriet Hogue. We'll hear more about the "Big Bird Sampler" in the future. Kathy Bourne showed us her progress on the Scottish sampler from the guild workshop

held last August taught by Margriet Hogue.



Susan Schar brought a Christmas present from her mother: an antique sewing box. The box is made of pine with genuine old thread spools on the top. The box was purchased at a sale in Woodstock, IL.



Several members shared their favorite books on museum sampler collections, tapestries and Mary Queen of Scots and her needlework.


Next the kit for the 2002 guild project was distributed along with the stitching schedule. Leslie Lewis showed us how to do queen stitch and explained some of the instructions that were a bit confusing. There are 19 members working on the 2002 guild project! The goal for February is to finish the first three motifs on the upper left hand side of the sampler. We are all going to get very, very good at queen stitch!Please bring your 2002 project sampler to a future meeting to show everyone your progress. 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Mystery Band Sampler

The program at February's general meeting is "Mystery Band Sampler" by Jana P. Kerr. Originally this was an EGA project with 15 lessons. This pretty sampler teaches a wide variety of counted thread techniques including some drawn work. There is no cost for the instructions. They will be distributed at the meeting, but you must reserve your copy by signing up at the January meeting or by sending an email to Roberta Siegel, the program chair. You must gather your own materials. This narrow sampler was originally stitched on 2.5" wide 25-count linen banding in an ivory color. It takes one yard of the banding. If you wish to use linen instead of banding, cut your fabric 6" wide to allow for hems. DMC floss colors are:



- 930
- 931
- 932
- 221
- 223
- 224
- 3051
- 3053
- 3045
- 3046
- Ecru Perle Cotton (Optional very small amounts are used)
- No. 8 Ecru
- No. 12 Ecru

If you wish to substitute different colors, the designer recommends that you use the same number of shades in each color family as the original design has. What a good way to practice new stitches without investing as much time as the large samplers take!

Banding is available from Welcome Stitchery in Crystal Lake. See the links page for address and directions.

Highlights

Elaine Hoagland welcomed everyone to the February meeting. This was followed by reports from the guild officers including a review of the 2002 program schedule by Roberta Siegal. Roberta also distributed the instructions for the Mystery Band Sampler and passed around a completed sampler so we could all study and admire it. Marilyn

Fettinger did a review of the LMSG website and described the new features that have been added in 2002. We had a table of books for sale including several older out of print books. We'll continue to have a book sale at future meetings. Please bring any books that you would like to sell. For show and tell, Mary Tulloch brought in a book on early English culture titled "Pleasures of the Imagination" Marilyn Fettinger showed a recently purchased book titled "Needlework Masterpieces from Winterthur". Leslie Lewis talked about the 2002 project, the Spot Sampler. The border color of the third motif on the chart is different than the picture included in the kit. Leslie stitched it in the charted color, a light mint green. She showed another sampler stitched in the color in the picture, a dark green. Leslie handed out detailed charts for the first and third motifs. The color numbers are very small and hard to read on the original chart so this should be helpful for those who have not yet started these motifs. She also gave out instructions for the spider patterns that appear in the squares of the third motif.

Leslie started a board for the Lake Michigan Sampler Guild on ezBoard. This will enable members to have discussions on various topics between meetings. One of the topics is the Spot Sampler Project. If you have a suggestion, comment or question on the project, please enter it on the board. Or just visit the board and read the entries from other guild members.

Carol Shaal has been busy working on Abigail Chase, a kit distributed at the January meeting. She brought in her almost finished sampler for us to see. Fast work, Carol! We'll expect to see it finished at the next meeting!



Carol also brought in an antique sampler that she recently purchased. The sampler was dated June 1832. She is still studying the sampler to try to make out the name of the person who stitched it. After reading the article in the last online newsletter, Carol thinks the sampler is Dutch. It has muslin on the back and it is covered with many alphabets. It also has some small motifs like a key and dog. Unfortunately, the sampler did not photograph well because of the lack of contrast between the linen and thread color. The picture does not show all of the intricate alphabets.



Marilyn Vanover brought in several pieces of needlework that she has completed. At the right is a series of flower motifs done in Brazilian embroidery. The sampler on the left below won two ribbons including the Best of Show in the embellished category at the National Counted Cross Stitch Show. Congratulations, Marilyn!

Anna's Hart

Lauren Sauer will be teaching her piece "Anna's Hart". The kit fee is \$18.00. The kit includes 36 or 40 count linen, soie D'alger and Sampler Threads. Stitches include cross, Smyrna cross, padded satin, Palestrina knots, stem, eyelet and Gobelin. The finished project will fit a 5 x 7 inch frame or box lid.

Sign up for the workshop by the February meeting, either in person at one of the guild meetings or by mail. See the workshop signup procedures for detailed registration instructions. Please indicate whether you want the 36 or the 40 count linen when you register. A check for \$18.00 must accompany your signup.



There will be no teaching fee in addition to the kit fee. All are encouraged to attend the presentation whether or not you decide to do the project. Lauren will be giving background information on the original sampler from which the project motif was taken.

Highlights

Twenty-seven members attended the March general meeting where the program was presented by Lauren Sauer. The meeting began with a report from our membership chair, who said that we now have 105 members. We also had a report from the treasurer followed by a review of the upcoming program schedule by the program chair. If you haven't sent in your membership dues yet for 2002, there's still time. Leslie Lewis talked about the 2002 project, the Spot Sampler. If you have not yet started the sampler, be aware that there is an error in the instructions about where to start the first motif. The instructions say to start it 5" in and 3" down. If you do this, you will have less than a 1" margin on the right side of the sampler. Leslie guesses that the instructions were written for a larger piece of linen. Make sure you center the design yourself on the linen.



If you have already started the sampler and have this problem, please share your solutions on our message board. Or share any other experience with the 2002 project.

Our first show and tell item was from Pat Carlson. She attended Mystery Night at Jeanine Koons' seminar in Williamsburg. The project, presented by Merry Cox, was titled "The Courtship". Wonder how Pat got it finished so quickly!





Next, Kelly Borsberrry showed us her "Oui Pocket". This project was from the French Stitching Fantasy presented by CA Wells and Marcia Brown on Cape Cod in October 2001.





Marilyn Vanover encouraged everyone to sign up for the Flax Sampler class. She highly recommends the teacher, Eileen Bennet. Marilyn brought in here finished Flax Sampler for us to admire.



Our program "Anna's Hart" was presented by Lauren Sauer. We learned that the motif on the sampler was taken from the lower right corner of a larger spot motif sampler stitched in Finland in 1747. The original was on 53 count linen stitched over two. Thank goodness the kits we got



were on 35 or 40 count linen!Lauren had several pictures of other samplers where the same tree appears including the one on the cover of Sue Studebaker's "Ohio Samplers" book. The earliest example she has found of the tree is on a German sampler from 1720 that is in the collection of Margariet Hogue. Lauren has also found the tree in a book on illuminate manuscripts from the 13th century.



Lauren encouraged us to have fun with the project. She said:

- Substitute a different stitch
- · Change thread colors
- Don't be a purist about mixing fibers try it!

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Going for the Blue Ribbon

Date: 4/14/2002 Time: 1:30-4:00 Type: Meeting

Location: Glen Ellyn Library **Teacher:** Eileen Bennett

In needlework competition, even minor flaws make a difference between a first place ribbon or no ribbon. Correct thread manipulation can eliminate the common problems of twisted threads, split stitches, crowded stitches, uneven tension, shadowed threads, obvious starting and stopping points in a thread and "fuzzy" cross stitches.

Needleworker and judge, Eileen Bennett, will discuss problem areas such as how to handle isolated or single stitches, working over one thread of linen, using hoops or frames, thread ply and correct needle size. Additional information covering framing hints, conservation tips and fabric hygiene are additional points in the 'pursuit of excellence!

This is a 'hands on' as well as a discussion class to eliminate improper working habits and an opportunity to explore your needlework through a judge's eye. Many stitching tips and techniques for winning 'blue ribbons' will be shared and students will have one piece of needlework critiqued.

Attendees are encouraged to bring some scrap linen, DMC (any will do) and a scissor to practice some of the prize winning tips she will impart to us. There will be numerous handouts available to all who attend. This will be a great program — not to be missed!

Highlights

The program at our April meeting was "Going for the Blue Ribbon," with stitching tips by Eileen Bennett. We also heard some wonderful reports about Sampler Gathering, which made those left behind feel as if we had been there (almost.) Thanks, Leslie, Judy and the rest. Eileen told about Rockome and the judging there and some of the things she looks for when she peers through her double set of glasses and magnifiers at the submitted pieces. We felt good about the things we already do right and made notes about the things we can change. Here are some excerpts:

Fuzzy thread is a no-no. If your thread becomes fuzzy, cut it off and start with a new strand. Use an away-waste knot when beginning a color so that you can later plan where to tuck it into the back. When you run out of thread in the middle of a row, do not weave the old end into the part you have just stitched. This leaves an enlarged hole in the linen where you quit. Instead, pull the loose end in the direction you are headed and cover it up with the new stitches. If you are doing something that has a few dots of contrasting color, such as a polka dot dress or even a striped skirt, do not do all the background color then go back and fill in the dots with the new

color. They will never lay right. Instead, stitch the new color dots as you come to them, and park that needle and thread out of the way until you come to the next dot. And above all, have a clean and ironed finished project. She recommends washing all needlework when complete. If overdyed threads make this impossible, wash the linen before you begin. Stoney Creek sells a product called Cotton Wash that works wonderfully on all types of fabric. Ivory and Dreft are also good products.

For those who are uptight about their stitching and must follow arbitrary rules, Eileen has a recipe for a drink which will loosen them up. It's called a Shooter, and contains prune juice and vodka. Her lecture was fun.



Using the "A Note Book Of Sampler Stitches #1" as a text book, The Flax Samler provides

a "practice" area for leaning each stitch which includes twelve pulled thread techniques.

The wonderful history of each stitch will also be shared. These tiny squares, or practice

areas are so addictive that I must put a "warning sign" on this class...you won't want to stop!



Worked on 32-count antique white Belfast linen, The Flax Sampler measures 6.9inches wide by 6.1 inches high.

Kit contains: 32-count Belfast Linen, antique white color fabric (cut 13 inches wide by 12 inches high), 4 colors of DMC threads, #80 Special Dentelles, #12 Pearl Cotton, #24 tapestry needle, chart, instruction booklet, photo, bibliography and "A Note Book Of Sampler Stitches #1".

Kit Fee: \$48 per student. If you already own the book, "A Notebook of Sampler Stitches #1", the cost of the kit will be \$40.

Teaching Time: 6 hours of instruction is needed.

Student Proficiency Level: An intermediate level class. Student must know Cross Stitch and have had experience working on linen fabric

Student to Bring to class: a 4 or 5-inch hoop (if used), scissors, pencil, extra lighting and magnification if needed.

chances and share your work with the members of the guild.



Sue Studebaker - Ohio Samplers lecture. CANCELLED

We are sorry to have to inform the membership that the May 19th meeting program, a lecture on Ohio samplers by Sue Studebaker, has been cancelled due to illness in her family. Hopefully this program can be scheduled again in the future as there is great interest in the subject and the lecturer.

Sue Studebaker is the author of the book "Ohio Samplers Schoolgirl Embroideries 1803-1850". This book was done for an exhibition presented by the Warren County Historical Society Museum in Lebanon, Ohio. Exhibition dates were May 15 through July 3, 1988.





Highlights

Our guild now has 120 members. The board has approved a discounted membership fee of \$15 for those who join after June 1st. Remember to sign up for those summer workshops! The upcoming workshops were reviewed and a list of proposed programs and workshops for 2003 was distributed.

Our original program, a lecture on Ohio samplers by Sue Studebaker, was cancelled by the speaker. It was replaced by an excellent program on "Unusual and/or New Silk Fibers" given by one of our own guild members, Kathy Joassin. We had a small group which met at the Barrington Library and everyone who attended learned something new about silk.

Kathy began with a description of how silk is produced. Did you know that:

- · Silk worms are the only domesticated insect
- · Silk worms love to eat mulberry leaves
- · Silk worms don't fly
- · Silk is really produced by a caterpillar, not a worm
- The production of silk dates back to 3000 B.C.
- A single cocoon can produce a fiber 2,000 to 3,000 feet long
- There are two different types of silk: filament silk consists of one continuous stand from a entire cocoon while spun silk is made of shorter lengths of silk spun together
- · Filament silk is more lustrous than spun silk.

Kathy

passed out an article on the history of silk called the "Silk Road". We learned that the production of silk originated in China and was a highly guarded secret. China exported silk by caravan over the "Silk Road", a route that went from China to the Roman Empire before the birth of Christ. The secret of silk production was slowly smuggled out to other countries, including one princess who took the silkworm eggs out of China in her headdress. In the 20th century, silk was not commonly available and cotton became popular. During the world wars years, limited imports from the east affected the supply of silk. It is only within the last 20-30 years that silk has again become generally available and popular for needlework.



Kathy recently attended a Kreinik seminar on silks. She learned a couple of important facts. First, the presenter stated that there is no right or wrong direction for a silk thread. Second, Kreinik has reduced their product line to three silks: Mori (6 ply spun silk), Serica (3 ply filament silk) and Bella. Soie D'Algier will no longer be be distributed by Kreinik.

Kathy

had numerous samples of silk and color charts from various manufacturers. She had old silk from the 1850s and modern silk. You could examine the threads with a magnifying

glass and see the differences in thickness and number of strands (ply) for each type of thread. Samples were shown from:

- Splendor
- Kreinik
- · Pearsall's
- Caron
- Madeira



Kathy also discussed specialty silks. Some sources don't actually produce silk, but purchase silk and then dye it or process it in special ways. For example, Alyce Schroth produces naturally dyed silks and was featured in Needlework magazine in 1999.

If you are aware of other sources for silk, please tell Kathy so we can add them to the list. Or, if you have used specialty silks, tell us about your experience. Kathy encouraged anyone who has not stitched with silk to try it. You'll never want to go back to cotton again!

Kathy Joassin showed us a sampler she stitched for a lifelong friend. She gave her friend a choice of samplers from a selection of charts and she picked the ER – IT sampler dated 1722 from the Scarlet Letter. The sampler is over three feet long! Hey Kathy, do you need any more friends?







Judy Roubick brought in a work in progress: the Morning Song sampler by Just Nan. It is stitched on 28 count Graziano Riviera cream/natural gingham linen. We'll look forward to seeing the completed sampler.

Kits will be available at the April 14th meeting for pickup allowing almost two months for pre-stitching. The only pre-stitching that HAS to be done for the workshop is on the bag and/or box itself. The smalls can be completed at a later date if need be. The workshop will concentrate on the FINISHING of the main item. You will be expected to attend the workshop and the balance of the kit fee and the teaching fee will be due on the day of the workshop.

When you register for the class, please let us know if you can bring a sewing machine. We will need approximately one machine for every six attendees. We also need irons and ironing boards and Olfa cutters and boards (used by quilters).

The kit fees are as follows: Swan Lake \$130.00 and Milady \$65.00. Merry does not put a maximum on the number of participants, so the teaching fee will depend on the number of attendees. That cost will be estimated in April when we know how many will attend.

On

Saturday, June 8, Merry Cox's "Swan Lake" drawstring mending bag is done in red and white toile and has a stitched outer cover which unsnaps and folds

down to reveal a sampler needle book on one side and a small pocket with swans on

the other. The needlework, done all in red, depicts a countryside scene of a woman holding a parasol, trees and swans in a lake. The other side is a redwork sampler.




Hogue presented a lecture and showed many slides of Dutch samplers. She began by discussing

early text samplers dating back to the 1600s. Text samplers, like the one shown at the left, contain text on the top, side and bottom. Bands are found down one side and motifs are in the center. We learned that many of the samplers contained a house mark and/or a coat of arms which helps to identify the origin of the sampler.

During the lecture, Margriet pointed out the different types of motifs found on Dutch samplers. She showed us slides that illustrated how the motifs recurred on many different samplers. We learned the motifs used could identify the area where

a sampler was stitched, especially on the early samplers. Margriet also talked about the symbolism and origin of many of the motifs. Some of the motifs we saw included:

- Ship of life
- · Monkey spinning the thread of life
- · Sewing basket
- Unicorn
- Peacock
- House
- Church
- Winged heart
- Marriage wreath

Margriet brought along an antique Dutch sampler to show us. This sampler is dated 1738.

We had a great time at our "welcome back" meeting. We had many items for sale including books, charts, kits, magazines and more..





How many of you went home with more than you came with??? We thought the idea was to reduce the size of your stash, not to increase it!

Kathy Joassin did a presentation on silk and gold. We learned that gold thread was created by beating the gold and drawing it thru holes to create a fine wire. The wire was cut into strands and then woven in and out of fabric. This was a practice that was continued through medieval times. Unfortunately, in later years, this cloth was burned to recover the gold.

Early gold work was pure gold. Later, it was discovered that gold could be layered over silver. Kathy said that there was been no pure gold work done for 500 years.



Today, there are two general categories of "metal thread", modern synthetic fibers that are polyester (or some other synthetic) and threads that are made from real metal. The real metal threads can be broken down into two types: either coiled metal strands with a hollow core or very thin metal strands wound around what is usually a silk core. The coiled hollow core metal threads can be couched or cut and used like beads. Metal thread can have several threads twisted together to form a thicker strand. Thicker threads may be couched down where as thinner ones may be used as thread. The metal thread must be handled with care so that the twists are not stretched out which ruins the thread.

Kathy showed us several examples of gold work from modern pieces that her daughter stitched to antique Indian collars from the 1920's. Kathy brought her metallic and silk thread samples so we could take a closer look at the variety of threads available on the market today. Thanks to Kathy for sharing her knowledge about silk and gold threads with us! Her presentation was very interesting and informative.



Many members brought projects for show and tell. Some of our members shared projects that won ribbons this year. Congratulations! Other member showed us completed projects that proved some of us did some stitching over the summer!



Pat Carlson finished the guild 4th birthday kit: a mini needlepoint sampler on 40 count silk gauze designed by Nancy Sturgeon of Threads Through Time. Thanks for sharing your hard work with us, Pat. Perhaps it will motivate the rest of us to get it done!



Updated bylaws were distributed in the last newsletter. The details of the updates were reviewed. New offices were elected for 2003 including

- Treasurer Sue Hamer
- Assistant Program Chairman Kathy Bourne
- President Leslie Lewis

Joanne began her presentation with slides of commissioned 17th century needlework projects stitched by profession needle workers. Projects included clothing, gloves and spot samplers

We learned that, in the sixteen hundreds, needlework was one of the main areas of study for a young girl. Whether she was tutored at home or sent away to boarding school, needlework was an important part of her education. At school, she may have stitched a polychrome sampler, a white work sampler, or stitched pictures for a cabinet.

Joanne showed us slides of Hannah Smith's cabinet which was made in 1654-1656 when Hannah was 12 years of age. Remarkably, the cabinet contained a letter in one of its compartments written by Hannah. We saw pictures of the actual letter while Joanne read and explained it to us. Joanne encouraged all of us to document our needlework so that future generations will know something about each piece and the person who stitched it.

Joanne also discussed some of the sources for needle work designs including pattern books and carpets. She referenced many sources that we could use to get additional information. She suggested that we read diaries written by people of the time to learn more about life in the 1600's including: Samuel Pepy's diaries (see www.pepys.info). She also mentioned Hannah Woolley's The Gentlewoman's Companion.

Joanne talked about examples of 17th century needlework including Ann Holewll and samplers from other Judith Hale students. She showed us wonderful slides of the Loara Standish sampler, which is the oldest signed piece of American needlework circa 1640. We saw incredible pictures of both the front and the back of the sampler. Joanne also mentioned some of the other American samplers of the 17th century including Mary Hollingworth (1665), Mary Atwood, Elizabeth Roberts, Sarah Stone, Sarah Collins (1673) and Elizabeth Cotton (1698).

At the end of the 1600's, sampler styles began to change. Samplers were no longer stitched over three threads, but over two threads. Long religious verses began to appear on samplers and cross stitch became the predominate stitch. We all learned a lot from Joanne's presentation and we thoroughly enjoyed her wonderful slides.

We hope to see you at the next meeting, our holiday party. Get busy stitching those ornaments for the ornament exchange! Need some inspiration? Check out pictures of last years ornaments.


