There were a couple of announcements. Cottage Stitchery is closing on February 14th and they are having a graduated sale. Please contact them for more information.



Amy's Sampler Collection Part 1

Amy Keaton will bring her collection of antique samplers and will share information about them. Her collection contains a number of different types of samplers from both Europe and the United States.

Highlights

The theme of our February meeting was definitely samplers, samplers and more samplers! Several of our members brought finished projects for show and tell. Then we were treated to more samplers from Amy Keaton's private antique collection. The February meeting began with a few announcements:

 museum, take a a trip or read a good book, if it's related to needlework, we'd
 like to hear about it! Just take a few minutes and write up your experience

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We had several items for show and tell:

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After show and tell, we had a program presented by Amy Keaton. Amy showed us part of her personal collection of antique samplers. She has been doing talks about her collection for four years, but said that we made her a bit nervous because the the caliber of stitching done by our members!

We had a delightful surprise – after Amy showed each sampler as she talked about it and then passed it around the room so we could get a very



close look at each one. We found out that Amy has been interested in samplers since 1988 and that she purchased her first antique sampler in 1990. The first sampler she showed was titled "How I almost started my sampler collection" since it was actually the second one she purchased. From there, we went back in time to the 1600's. We saw samplers from this time frame up through the 1800's. Some of the highlights included:

- Earliest sampler A spot sampler from the mid to late 1600's
- "Ann Scott" A 17th century English band sampler. Amy also showed us the reproduction stitched by Susan Balsai from the Scarlet Letter. This is the only one of Amy's samplers that has been reproduced.
- An orphanage piece stitched entirely in black. The sampler is signed Ann Hadley 18- – age 10. It looks like the date has been picked out.
- A German sampler signed AK from 1762. This sampler was unusual because three different thread colors were used in each letter.
- A Danish sampler dated 1769 that had vertical alphabet borders on each side. Amy thinks that this was a school girl piece because of the symmetry found in the sampler.
- An English sampler by Ellinor Dear, borne May 30, 1787 stitched when she
 was 12 years old. This sampler was amazing because it was stitched on at
 least 70 count linen.
- And much, much more!



We would like to thank Amy for sharing her wonderful sampler collection with us. It was a great opportunity to see real antique samplers from many different countries up close. It made us appreciate the variety of pieces stitched by these young girls using many different materials, threads and stitches.

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Sailor's Huswif

Merry Cox has been scheduled for workshops in March, 2004. Because of the pre-stitching involved, the deadline for registration for these workshops was June 15, 2003. Registration for these workshops is now closed. Merry will teach the assembly of these two kits during each of the teaching sessions. That means that all stitching has to be completed before the class meets next March. Since there is so much stitching involved, she would like to send the kits to attendees by the end of June. Therefore, Kathy Bourne needs to receive registrations at the May and June meetings or by mail before the middle of June. Members will find her address in the Guild directory.

Merry

Cox will teach her "Sailor's Huswif" on Saturday, March 13, 2004. An antique huswife made by a sailor in the 1800's inspired Merry to create "A Sailor's Huswife". The antique huswife has plain satin fabric in the outside. For the outside of your huswife, Merry has designed a lovely flower vine and wrote an original verse which you will stitch cross stitch, rococo stitch and over one in 32ct line. The antique has pockets on the inside embellished with beads, mirrors and trims. Merry has designed the inside with a ship at the top back-stitched in black to resemble scrimshaw. There are four pockets, two of which have mirrors like the antique, but have the added beauty of needlework. The kit includes all stitching and finishing materials and exclusive scrimshaw.

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- The kit price for the Huswif is \$140.
- The teaching fee is \$35.

Fun with Finishing

Date: 5/2/2004 Time: 1:30-4:00 Type: Meeting Location: Sunrise

Teacher: LMSG-Kathy Bourne

Fun With Finishing combines demonstration and group participation in order to teach several different techniques useful in finishing needlework. Numerous finished pieces will be examined and discussed. Demonstrations will include making cord of one, two and three colors, making tassels, finishing ornaments, mounting needlework to fit a plain box, use of iron-on bonding material, hemstitching, finishing edges of small pieces and other such techniques as time will permit. Participants should bring six to eight skins of embroidery floss in a variety of colors

for making cording and tassels. Those who may wish to try finishing a small piece of needlework such as an ornament or bookmark should bring their pieces, a 5x 7 piece of acid free mat board, thread to match the ground fabric of the piece, a regular sewing needle, a small ruler, a small bottle of fabric glue and a skein of floss in a coordinating color. A small crank for winding cord if you have one. Those who wish to learn hemstitching should bring a piece of linen (28 count or above is OK) about 5×7 to 8×10.

The Guild will provide other equipment needed.

Care and Mounting of Textiles

This workshop is a program designed to provide participants with practical information for use in producing quality needlework and for making a professional quality mount for their finished pieces. Participants in the workshop need to provide the following materials.

- One finished piece of needlework that is clean, pressed, blocked and ready for mounting.
- A piece of acid-free mat board, also known as museum board, cut inch greater than both the vertical and horizontal dimensions of the piece to be mounted.
- A piece of neutral colored 100% cotton fabric that has been washed, well rinsed and pressed. The fabric should not have any folds or wrinkles and must be 2 inches greater than the vertical measurement of the mounting board and 2 times the horizontal dimension plus 2 inches.
- Thread to match the ground fabric of the needlework.
- A regular sewing needle and a fine curved needle.
- · A small ruler such as a clear quilting ruler.
- Scissors and a thimble, if desired. The guild will provide any additional equipment needed.

Highlights of the Winterthur Needlework Collection

Date: 6/13/2004 Time: 1:30-4:00 Type: Meeting

The title of Linda Eaton's lecture is "Highlights of the Winterthur Needlework Collection" and she will conduct a one and a half hour conservation clinic. Each member may bring up to three items for Linda to consider. All members will benefit from her insights into issues of conservation. Linda brings scholarship, knowledge and enthusiasm to her presentation of a slide show and lecture. Linda was a key speaker at the Winterthur Museum symposium last fall and at several other venues since. Free to members, \$20 for non-members.

Highlights

Kathy Bourne began the meeting with a few announcements about the upcoming schedule. Amy Keaton told us about a special project being done by the National Society of Colonial Dames to create an inventory of American Needlework. If you have a piece that you would be willing to list in the inventory, fill out the form and submit it. Forms will be available online in the near future.

Kathy introduced Linda Eaton, Curator of Textiles at the Winterthur Museum. Linda began with some general information about the museum. Winterthur was founded in 1951, but its history reaches back to the 19th century. Winterthur was the home of Henry Francis du Pont. Du Pont bought many pieces of needlework to decorate the 175 rooms of his county estate. The museum includes a research library which is open to the public, conservation labs, exhibit rooms and eight floors of period rooms to explore. The museum has over 700 pieces of needlework in its collection.

Linda told us about the needle work and also about the history of the collection itself. We learned about the first pieces purchase by Mr. du Pont: an embroidered map and silk work globe. He collected many pieces stitched by girls who attended Delaware schools. Linda said that the chapter in Betty RIng's book on Delaware samplers is fairly small. Sue Swan has done research on Delaware samplers and has donated her papers to the library at Winterthur They are available for researchers to examine.

Linda showed samplers made over several generations by women who were members of the same family. It was interesting to note the changes in the style, materials and techniques over time. Linda said that the differences were due to a change in educational focus, not a deterioration in needlework skills.

Linda encouraged us to not just look at the sampler itself. She said to look at the mounting techniques which may vary locally. The secondary woods may also be a ay to

identify where a piece is from. She told us to make sure that we label our work for future reference. She closed her talk by inviting every to "come and visit the Winterthur Museum and see the wonderful pieces that we have".

The end of the 17th century saw a dramatic stylistic change in the design format of the Anglo American sampler. During the first quarter of the 18th century, three distinctive styles can be identified in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Boston, Massachusetts, and Newport, Rhode Island. Our focus will be on samplers worked in Newport, Rhode Island. The beginning of the century samplers were worked in "the English style". Gradually an elegant form of sampler making emerged in Newport. The styles developed there greatly influenced other areas of sampler making in Rhode Island.

FRANCES

AYRAULT 1725-1726 Antique Reproduction Sampler

The little sampler was the first attempt at sampler embroidery by Frances Ayrault of Newport, Rhode Island. She was born September 23, 1718. The upper portion displays

a rendition of the popular Irish Stitch pattern worked in Cross Stitch. Frances then

recorded various sets of initials of her twelve brothers and sisters. It is such an endearing little sampler and is best described by the words chosen by Frances to end

the piece, Frances Ayrault her first sampler.

The sampler will be worked on either 34 or 40 count linen, your choice with DMC floss

in Cross Stitch.

Kit: Choose 32 ct. Lambs Wool linen or 40 ct. Lambs Wool linen

One of the most prestigious groupings of embroideries worked in New England

from the later part of the eighteenth century into the nineteenth century can be attributed to the

Balch

Academy

in

Providence

Rhode Island

. The academy was conducted under the accomplished hands of Mary "Polly" Balch. Many of the known Balch Academy embroideries are very sophisticated in both design and stitching techniques, yet very few examples have surfaced that can be attributed to the work of a particular child in her preparation for a more sophisticated sampler. We would like to share with you the preliminary work of Betsy Davis which has come to light in recent years. Her sampler is signed "Betsy Davis's sampler wrought at 8 years of age

Providence

October 22, 1794

". Her preparatory sampler led to a more elaborate accomplishment three years later. The larger sampler is housed in the

Museum



of
Fine Arts

,

Boston

.

The sampler will be worked on 28 count linen in DMC floss. The stitches include
Cross Stitch over one and two threads, Rice Stitch, Algerian Eye, Queen Stitch and
Satin Stitch. Kit cost: is \$48.50 plus a teaching fee to be announced.


