

Highlights



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
2009 Hornbook Project

At our March meeting, the hornbook project from Ellen Chester of With My Needle will be the program. Check out the description on Ellen Chester's web site www.withmyneedle.com. Click on the image at the right for a larger picture.

Sign ups for our Hornbook Project will be taken only during December and January. The cost of the entire kit—hornbook, pattern, linen, silk, and finishing–will be \$30. This MUST BE PAID at the time of signup. You can choose 32 or 36 count linen and blue, green or red silk. The deadline for the project will be the January 11th meeting.





Highlights

We began our March meeting with a short business meeting. We voted on and passed updates to our by-laws and there were some announcements:

- In April, Amy Keaton will present part three of her sampler collection.
- · There is no meeting scheduled for May.
- In June, Margriet Hogue will present a workshop. Deadline for signing up is March 31st. The teacher's fee for the
 workshop will be about \$75. There must be a minimum of 12 people to have the workshop. We don't have 12
 people signed up yet, so if you intend to take the workshop, make sure you sign up by March 31st.

Mary Ann Anderson gave us an update on the progress of the 2009 Anniversary project. All of the letters are now taken, but if you haven't signed up yet, you can pick from numbers, motifs or bands. Mary Ann gave us a quick look at several sheets that have already been completed so that we could get an idea of what others have done. She stressed that each will be different and individual and that is what will make it fun. You can also contribute a poem or drawing.

The program was turned over to Carol Schaal to distribute the Quaker Hornbook kits. There were 28 people who signed up. Carol put together the kits including the hornbook, chart, thread and and linen. She passed out an article on the history of hornbooks and talked a bit about them. The stitching is just cross stitch, but you will definitely have a chance to practice your over 1 skills. Carol also gave us a hint on how to do a row of over 1s: do a tent stitch in one direction and then do the tent stitch back in the opposite direction. This uses more thread which gives more body to the the completed piece. You also don't have to be concerned about losing stitches! We enjoyed opening the kits and getting started on the project. Carol had completed two hornbooks that she passed around the room for us to look at.







Hope to see everyone in April for part three of Amy's sampler collection. You won't want to miss it! You'll get a chance learn about some of her antique samplers and to examine them up close.

Amy Keaton will bring part 3 of her collection of antique samplers and will share information about them. Her collection contains a number of different types of samplers from both Europe and the United States.

Mary Ann Anderson gave us an update on the progress of the 2009 Anniversary project. It's been very exciting to see the results come in. If you have not yet turned in your pages, please give them to Mary Ann by the June meeting. This will give her plenty of time to compile them by our October Anniversary party.

Amy Keaton presented the program: part three of her sampler collection. It has been several years since part two, so she had many new samplers to show us. We saw English, Dutch, Scottish and American samplers. There were samplers from the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries. The variety was fantastic from a simple marking sampler to an ornate sampler stitched entirely with tiny beads. Amy shared the stories behind each sampler including what she knew about the sampler and the stitcher and how she found it. After her presentation, we all got a chance to come up to the front of the room and study the samplers up close. Thanks, Amy, for sharing your samplers with us!

We did not get enough participants in our June workshops to have Margriet Hogue come and teach, so we have decided to do one of her kits as a group project instead. We will be starting "The Four Agreements" at our June meeting. If you want to participate, sign up by May 12th to order the kit. The cost is \$57 and the guild will pay the shipping. Just bring along another project to work on! The Four Agreements. an original design from The Essamplaire, is based on the Toltec wisdom and the writings of Don Miguel Ruiz. It sets out a road map of four basic tenants for us to live our lives by. Size: Measures 16.5" x 7.5" (42cm x 19cm). Thread Count: Worked on 40 count (16 thr/cm)linen Recommended Level: Intermediate Cost: \$57.00 with silk The deadline for sign up is May 12th. The kit cost of \$57 must be paid when you sign up. The guild will pay the shipping costs.

Highlights

Our vice president, Marilyn Vanover, ran the June meeting since our president was unable to attend. She began the business meeting by welcoming everyone and reviewing our upcoming schedule:

- Members were reminded that any forms for the Bristol Orphanage inspired Alphabet and Design book for our 2009 Anniversary are due. Please send any forms to Mary Ann Anderson as soon as possible.

Our program was "The Four Agreements" sampler from Margriet Hogue. Kits were passed out to those who ordered them. Katie already had the kit so she has been working on it since the April meeting. She gave us the following recommendations:



- Baste around the edge of the sampler. Since it does not have any type of border, this will
 give you a point of reference to help position the motifs. It will also help your framer.
- Watch the chart for the letter "s" in the word agreements. Some of the letter is not quite correct.
- In the branch under the bird in the middle, there is an incorrect symbol It is marked gold instead of light green.
- The symbol used for the bird's foot does not exist. It should be stitched in brown.
- The symbol used for the bird's beak does not exist. It should be stitched in brown.

We all agreed that the actual sampler is much prettier than the picture. If you didn't get your kit, please contact Susan Balsai. Mary Snell told us about a trip she took to Northern Italy. It was a tour done by Italia Invita focused on needle arts. They visited many towns in Northern Italy and got to see the local needlework. She brought in books, brochures and samples of their work. She bought the pillow from one of their needle work guilds. We enjoyoed hearing about her trip and looking at the books that she brought back. We were inspired by the great show and tell!







Marilyn Fettinger did a short talk on Kumihimo, a Japanese braiding technique. Cording can be made in many different patterns and varies in size based on the number and type of fibers used. It's perfect for holiday ornaments! She demonstrated how you make a spiral braid and those who were interested got to try the technique. You can order a kit to get started for \$14 at

It includes an instruction booklet, a styrofoam disk Kumi Loom, eight bobbins and enough thread for your first project. It's a great way to use up all those extra fibers and an interesting alternative to twisted cord. See you next month at the annual guild picnic! Don't forget to bring a dish to share! 2009 Abigail Davis Workshop

Date: 6/13/2009 Time: 9:00-4:00 Type: Workshop Location: TBA

Teacher: Margriet Hogue

Abigail Davis was born in Gloucester County, New Jersey in 1808. She stitched her sampler in 1820 at the age of 12. The sampler has a brick Federal house flanked by pine trees and large animated parrots. Flowers spring from a pair of square flower pots. There is a curving rose border on three sides of the sampler. It contains cross, rice, queen, cross over one, freehand, stem, satin and encroaching satin stitches. Colors are greens, blues, rusts, black and golds.

You can find additional information about this sampler on the Antique Samplers web site at www.antiquesamplers.org. It is also listed in **American Samplers** by Bolton & Coe.



Closeups of the birds and the parrot on the sampler are shown below. Click on any of the images for a larger picture.

The antique measures 19 1/2 X 19 1/2 inches. The linen count is 35 and the threads will be silk. Kit fee is approximately \$150. The teaching fee estimate is \$75.

2009 Flame Stitched Emery Workshop

A properly-made emery should have a liner made of a stoutly woven cotton or silk, to keep the emery from leaking out. After you have made your emery into a firmly sewn shape, to polish a needle simply push the needle in and out of the emery. The cover for our emery will be stitched on linen using a silk flame stitch pattern.

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Where Did They Get That?

Teacher: Barbara Jackson

Barbara Jackson will present a slide show on 17th and 18th century motifs, how they overlapped in different needlework genres, and some of their origins.

Highlights

We spent a great weekend with Barbara Jackson! We had 20 people at the workshop on Saturday and everyone really enjoyed the Tea Time Basket. When we took a break, we even had tea and treats to enjoy!



There were 21 people for the Sunday crewel workshop. We learned many different kinds of stitches and "Cherries for Cherie" was truly a wonderful introduction to the art of crewel.

On Sunday, our president Joyce Reid started the meeting with a brief introduction and then continued with show and tell.

Mary Ann gave an update on the status of the anniversary book, "Letter by Letter". The book is done! It has about 100 pages and contains charts with letters, numbers and motifs along with verses and a history of the guild. All orders must be in by Friday, September 18th, so that she can get a final count to have them printed before the October meeting. She is very excited and pleased with the way the book came out. Make sure you order yours before the deadline. This will be a one time printing, so order an extra as a gift for a friend! Contact Marilyn Vanover to order the book.

Mary Ann Anderson brought "M. A. Tipper", a Bristol Orphanage sampler for show and tell. The sampler is very striking because it is quite large and stitched completely in red. This sampler was Mary Ann's inspiration for the "Letter by Letter" anniversary booklet. She also talked about a sampler that she finished by the Scarlet Letter, "Rachael Allen". Rachael is buried in a cemetery in Moline, Illinois. Mary Ann visited Rachael's grave this summer and brought her sampler along. We heard about Mary Ann's adventure and saw the pictures that were taken of her sampler and Rachael's tombstone.

Carol Schaal showed us "Black and White", a small sampler she completed designed by Eileen Bennett. It had a simple black frame that was perfect for the piece.

Marilyn Fettinger talked about "Mary Wigham", an Ackworth sampler that she is stitching from Needleprint. The chart can be downloaded from their website at www.needleprint.com.

Marilyn Vanover reviewed the schedule for the rest of 2009. The October meeting will be at the Glen Ellyn Library and the November meeting will be at the Wheaton Community Center because the library is not available.

Barbara Jackson presented our program, a slide show titled "Where Did They Get That?" on 17th and 18th century motifs. We saw pictures of motifs in old pattern books and pictures of the same motifs stitched on different pieces of needlework. She told us about Lady Brilliana Harley, a needleworker who lived during that time period and about the

letters she wrote that mentioned needlework supplies. Many of the items in Barbara's slides were from the Victoria and Albert Museum's collection in England. The linen was covered with unrelated motifs with hardly any empty space. One museum official referred to this as "the horror of the empty space". We really enjoyed Barbara's slides and the stories she told.

The Tea Time Basket Workshop

The kettle is hot! Come share a cuppa while creating a charming tea time basket band. The motifs are reminiscent of those sea faring days when tea was quite a luxury. Barbara has arranged motifs around two tea time sayings, but you can change things around to your liking. The embroidery was designed to fit inside an adaptation of a beautifully constructed Nantucket shopping basket. Just the thing ladies carried when they visited their friends for tea! The sailing ships, mermaids and delightful colonial maids are all ready to grace your work as you create your own "needle story" on 36 count Edinburgh. The basket measures approximately 7" x 9" x 6" high. The assembly of the lining is actually quite easy and will be demonstrated in class.



Kit contains: linen for bands and accessories, silks, complete instructions, extra graph paper, photos, needles, cardboard for base, and Nantucket basket from Olde Colonial.

Students to bring: lining fabric of their choice (complete explanation will be in the student letter), the usual stitching accessories and lighting, if needed.

Above is a picture of the basket in front a mirror so that you can see both sides of the band. The first picture below shows one end of basket wih the pin cushion and the second shows the other end with a scissor holder. Click on the pictures for a larger image.

Cherries for Cherie Workshop

Date: 9/13/2009 **Time:** 9:00-12:30 **Type:** Workshop

Location: Wheaton Community Center

Teacher: Barbara Jackson

Cherie, our charming but chubby, ewe hopes her tongue will each those ripe, ripe cherries if she just stands on her tippy

toes. Stitched on over-dyed Weeks Parchment linen using Heathway crewel yarns, our job will be to develop a perfectly

stitched landscape for our wooly friend to contemplate her challenge. The cherry motif was adapted from a design on a bedspread of early American origin in the Metropolitan Museum of rt. Good stitching techniques will the emphasized throughout the class. We will be working with chain stitch, stem stitch, satin, closed fly and tapestry shading – all easy stitches but susceptible to messiness if not handled correctly. Cherie does not like



messy. The 4" x 4" design can be mounted in a box, framed, made into a pincushion or stitched into a sewing pocket, as illustrated. There will be extra yarn available to change out berry colors if you would like. Students to bring: 6" or 7" deep sided wooden hoop OR 7" x 7" stretcher bars. A frame weight or K's frame stand or something else that will hold your hoop/frame steady. (Crewel is a two handed activity.) Sewing thread for basting, light and magnification, if needed.

Kit includes: linen with design pre-drawn, muslin, crewel yarns, needles, all instructions including those for sewing pocket. Click on the pictures for a larger image.

The kit cost of \$26 is due when you sign up for the workshop. Please enclose a check with the completed form. The teaching fee for this class will be \$26, payable to Lake Michigan Sampler Guild on the day of the class. Registration is now closed, but we <u>may</u> be able to accept a few more students.
